Sergeant Patrick Currin served the Town of Maynard with distinction for 25 years, beginning his career with the Maynard Police Department in 1969 and rising to the rank of Sergeant through unwavering dedication, integrity, and leadership. Prior to his service in Maynard, he became a member of the United States Army during the Korean War. Sgt. Currin served honorably as a military police officer from 1951 to 1961.
